

<u>Celebration Assemblies:</u> Take place from 1pm each Friday – unless otherwise stated.

<u>Virtue to live by:</u> Ambition – By reinforcing the virtuous learning characteristic of being ambitious in our life and our work, means living out our school mission by being motivated and showing great determination to learn and make progress. When faced with challenges throughout Lent, we show persistence and hidden desire to achieve our goals – no matter how high we set the bar in this season of Lent.

Monday 10th March: First Sunday of Lent

This Lent, I show ambition by not giving into temptation – linked to the story of Jesus being tempted in the wilderness (Luke 4: 1-13)

Monday 17th March: Second Sunday of Lent – The Transfiguration (Luke 9:28-36) I can think creatively to solve problems – linked to Saint Patrick findings creative ways to teach people about the Holy Trinity (St. Patrick's Day)

Monday 24th March: Third Sunday of Lent

I show ambition by challenging myself to seek forgiveness and forgive those who are unkind to me – linked to Jesus' ambitious teaching to repent and seek forgiveness; this is the key message of The Parable of The Fig Tree (Luke 13:1-9)

Monday 31st March: Fourth Sunday of Lent

I show ambition by striving to be the best version of me by not judging others – linked to the teaching of Jesus when he told the parable of The Prodigal Son (or, The Loving Father, or The Forgiving Father, or The Ungrateful Older Son) (Luke 15: 1 - 32).

Please do discuss these statements to help your child re-cap on the learning that has taken place each week, as we explore the weekend's gospel stories as read out by Canon Paul in church every Sunday morning.

<u>Eastwood Food Bank</u>: Please do send tinned and dried food into school as we continue to collect it in the main entrance. All food donations will be delivered to the Eastwood Food Bank on Friday 4th April, as the school breaks up for the Easter holidays.

<u>A prayer for Lent:</u> Dear Lord, as we are entering the season of Lent, help us to draw near to you in praise, stripping away all that distracts us from worship. As Jesus resisted temptation by the devil in the wilderness, help us reflect on his faithfulness to God; his rejection of worldly values and hold these thoughts in our hearts throughout Lent and into our future lives. **Amen.**

<u>Pray, Fast, Give this Lent:</u> Our chosen charitable theme in school this Lent is to simply pray for the poor and needy around the world; think about the times when we can Fast in line with our Lenten promises; and give food to the poor in our local area. As a school, pupils in Year 5 will deliver donations of pasta, rice, tinned food and UHT milk to the local Food Bank in Eastwood, before we break up for Easter.

<u>Free School Meals:</u> Children who officially qualify for free school meals are eligible for the Pupil Premium. This is not the same as universal free school meals for pupils in reception and year groups 1 and 2. Children who are in receipt of the Pupil Premium (including Armed Forces pupils) are charged 50% of the total costs of trips, after-school and breakfast clubs. <u>Science Week:</u> The theme is "Change and Adapt." The main message is about consuming less of the world's resources to offset the worst effects of the climate crisis by making decisions to adapt our lifestyles to reduce our impact through our ambition to recycle and reduce waste. See information on your child's Dojo to see what investigations and activities they will be doing next week ($10^{th} - 14^{th}$ March).

<u>Uniform:</u> Thank you for sending the children to school looking so smart – and in line with the school's uniform policy. One particular area of concern is jewellery: especially the wearing of earrings – on health and safety grounds, as some earrings seen at the moment could easily cause accidents at break and lunchtimes as children are actively playing on the field and the playground. (**Please see** "Jewellery" below). Please check this on the website if you are ever unsure about uniform and please do check your child has all their uniform as we have collected lots of lost property since the beginning of the academic year. Do come and claim any items that may have been lost from the school foyer – this area is a place that you can also donate unused uniform for others. Finally, to prevent uniform being lost, please label all items by sewing or embroidering names and initials to the inside of items; this will then make it easier for clothing to be returned.

<u>Jewellery:</u> (The uniform policy states) Pupils may wear up to one pair of inexpensive earrings, providing they are small and in the lobe of the ear. They may also wear an inexpensive digital and/or analogue watch. (These must not be oversized or smart watches). All articles of jewellery must be removed for PE and when requested to do so by members of staff for your son or daughter to participate safely in curriculum activities — especially those of a practical nature.

<u>Sandwiches and snacks</u>: We ask that you send only healthy meals and snacks for your children to eat in school. Also, only send snacks that do not contain any nuts, as some of our children have serious nut allergies. Finally, if sending sweets for birthdays, teachers will give sweets out only at the end of the day with the instruction that pupils are only allowed to eat sweets when you have given them permission to do so – I know some parents do not like their children to receive sweets at school and other parents do not mind. Again, some children may well have allergies or have reactions to sweets that are given to them.

<u>World Book Day – Thursday 13th March:</u> To celebrate this event, children are welcome to come dressed as characters from their favourite stories. Like last year, some children may prefer to dress in comfortable clothes so they can relax when they read during the day. Please read the information posted by your child's Classteacher on Class Dojo. Two prizes of £10 per class will be awarded for pupils who can enthusiastically and accurately retell/summarise a book of their choice.

<u>Dogs</u>: Unless a guide dog, or a dog invited into school for educational purposes, under no circumstances are dogs allowed onto the school premises. Thank you to all for your cooperation in this matter.
